Church, by Mr. Panosh.) 3 (The following proceedings were held by the Court and all 4 three counsel at the bench, out of the hearing of the jury:) 5 THE COURT: What are Exhibit Numbers 125 and 126? 6 MR. PANOSH: These are the photo identifications 7 that he was asked about on cross-examination. 8 THE COURT: Taken at Camp Lejeune? 9 MR. PANOSH: Yes. 10 MR. LLOYD: These are from the witness Tammy 11 Patton, who has not testified in this case. 12 THE COURT: Well, Mr. --13 MR. PANOSH: Which is exactly --14 THE COURT: -- Hatfield's already asked him about 15 16 them. MR. PANOSH: That's what I pointed out at the 17 bench. 18 MR. HATFIELD: I just asked him if he prepared it. 19 MR. PANOSH: He asked him if he made an -- if she 20 made an identification. He said she did make an 21 identification. He asked if he communicated that 22 identification to a number of witnesses. He asked that at 23 least three times, as I recall. 24 Before they got into this, I came to the bench, I 25

said this was not the way we should be going. They've 1 opened the door. The State is now entitled to show that in 2 fact there was an identification, and that it was a valid 3 identification. Otherwise, at closing argument, they're going to argue, "Well, this was some --" 5 THE COURT: The Court will allow you to introduce 6 7 it. MR. HATFIELD: Excuse me. I'd like to be heard. 8 9 THE COURT: All right, sir. MR. HATFIELD: My purpose in asking whether this 10 lineup was prepared was to show that as a result of its 11 preparation, he did other things, which was to communicate 12 with other witnesses. I in no way suggested that this 13 lineup was either reliable or unreliable or had been 14 utilized to provide any testimony. Now, I would hate for 15 this Court to allow a photo lineup, when the witness who 16 supposedly looked at the photo lineup has not testified in 17 the case. Therefore --18 THE COURT: Well, you can call her. 19 MR. HATFIELD: Well, I don't have the burden of 20 proof. 21 THE COURT: I know, but you've opened the door for 22 it to come in. 23

MR. HATFIELD: I did not open the door.
